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### **Opportunity: Assistant Professor in Asian Modernities**

The Faculty of Arts and Science, University of Toronto invites applications for a full-time tenure stream position at the rank of Assistant Professor in Asian Modernities, starting 1 July 1 2009. This position is a 49 per cent appointment in the Asian Institute and a 51 per cent appointment in either the Departments of East Asian Studies or Sociology.

The Asian Institute is a research and teaching centre located in the Munk Centre for International Studies, specializing in all geographical areas of Asia, including, among others, Southeast and Northeast Asia (see [www.utoronto.ca/ai](http://www.utoronto.ca/ai)). The position will involve teaching responsibilities in the undergraduate and Master's degree programs in Asia Pacific Studies. These programs emphasize a comparative, interdisciplinary, and transnational approach to contemporary issues in both Southeast and East Asia.

The ideal candidate would advance interdisciplinary, interregional and comparative scholarship on Asian modernities. Research and teaching interests should engage emerging and novel ways of understanding modernity, its various forms, and its consequences in Asia. Topics can be far-ranging and could include such issues as the city, gender and sexuality, emerging configurations of labour, land and capital, or media, science and technology. Scholars whose work focuses on Southeast and/or Northeast Asia are encouraged to apply.

Only applicants with PhD in hand by July 1, 2009, excellence in research and teaching, and demonstrated proficiency in at least one Asian language will be considered. Salary is commensurate with qualifications and experience.

The closing date for applications is **15 October 2008**. Please apply with a full C.V., a chapter/article length writing sample and teaching dossier to the administrator of the search: Eileen Lam, Institute Manager and Project Officer, Asian Institute at the University of Toronto, Munk Centre for International Studies, 1 Devonshire Place, Toronto, Canada M5S 3K7. Please arrange for three letters of reference to be sent to the address above, under separate cover, and to arrive by the closing date.

The University of Toronto is strongly committed to diversity within its community and especially welcomes

applications from visible minority group members, women, Aboriginal persons, persons with disabilities, members of sexual minority groups, and others who may contribute to the further diversification of ideas. The University of Toronto offers the opportunity to teach, conduct research and live in one of the most diverse cities in the world. All qualified candidates are encouraged to apply; however, Canadians and permanent residents will be given priority.

### **Opportunity: SSHRC Standard Research Grant**

The Office of Research Services would like to remind faculty members of the upcoming deadline for the SSHRC Standard Research Grant of 15 October 2008.

**Submission Process:** ORS is requesting faculty members to submit their grant application to their Research Officers or Faculty contacts (please see Table 1). ORS requests you submit at least two weeks before the agency deadline. Each faculty may have their own requirements and deadlines. Submitting at least two weeks ahead will also qualify you for the ORS Early Submission Award. Please see details at the bottom of this announcement.

Submitting well in advance of the deadline allows for a full administrative review of the application. This administrative review compares each application to the programme guidelines and eligibility rules to ensure that the application is complete (signatures, budgets, ethics, CV etc.) and that it conforms to all guidelines (eligible expenses, margins, font size, use of data/figures etc.). In this way it can be ensured that every application leaving York University makes it to the funding agency's peer review and is not rejected prior to this process on administrative grounds.

This year, ORS will be providing full review services for all applications it receives up to and including **8 October**. After this date, we will be reviewing for completeness only and a full administrative review will not be provided.

In order to obtain institutional signature, co-applicants are required to submit a completed ORS checklist, along with a summary of the proposed research, a finalized budget and budget justification. Co-applicant's are responsible for sending the institutional signature page directly to the Principle Investigator.

**Submission Requirements:** Last year SSHRC introduced a new step in using the on-line forms. A "COMPLETE" button was added which finalizes the forms. These completed forms are the ones that must have all the required signatures. SSHRC will not accept signed "verified" forms. Unfortunately, after the forms are "completed," no further changes can be made unless SSHRC returns the application from their system, a potentially time-consuming process. Therefore, our submission process accommodates this step. Please note: ORS does not accept applications by email (e.g. Word docs or PDFs) for review.

**ORS Early Submission Award:** ORS is continuing a programme to provide a \$200 incentive to those who hand in a complete and verified application to their Faculty Research Officer two weeks in advance (October 1st) of the SSHRC Standard Research Grant deadline. *Please note this programme is targeting the main tri-council operating grant competitions only.*

**ORS hours and location:** ORS closes at 4:30pm daily. To assist faculty members with the processing of their grant applications, the Office of Research Services (ORS) will be open until 8:00 p.m. on Thursday, 9 October. ORS is located in 214 York Lanes.

### Opportunity: Modeling Interdisciplinary Inquiry - Andrew W. Mellon Foundation Postdoctoral Fellowship Program

Washington University announces the ninth year of Modeling Interdisciplinary Inquiry, an Andrew W. Mellon Foundation Postdoctoral Fellowship Program designed to encourage interdisciplinary scholarship and teaching across the humanities and social sciences.

We invite applications from recent PhDs for the position as Fellow. In September 2009, the selected Fellow will join our continuing Fellows in order to participate in the University's ongoing interdisciplinary programs and seminar. The Fellows will receive a two-year appointment with a stipend beginning at \$44,450 per year. Postdoctoral Fellows have an opportunity to plan and pursue their own continuing research in association with a senior faculty member at Washington University, and, over the course of their two-year appointment, to teach three undergraduate courses in the home discipline and to collaborate in an interdisciplinary theory and methods workshop.

On Thursday, 25 September 2008, YCAR will host an international symposium on Japan's total war mobilization in late colonial Korea with an emphasis on the culture of colonial Korea. The symposium will bring together scholars from Korea, Japan and Canada.

Scholars from several disciplines will discuss creative responses to Japan's totalitarian social and military control policies, the so-called *sinch'eje* (New Political Order/System), in the 1940s. The panellists will analyze a wide variety of cinematic, literary, and visual texts in order to achieve a comprehensive perspective on a difficult and complex period in Korean and Japanese history.

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### **York News: York professors' film debuts in Vancouver**

While Canada is often touted as an accepting nation of great diversity, it was not always so.

Department of Film professors John Greyson and Ali Kazimi teamed up with Toronto-based filmmaker Richard Fung to co-direct *Rex Vs. Singh*, an experimental exploration of Vancouver history and human rights. This 30-minute video examines a 1915 trial where two Sikh mill-workers, Dalip Singh and Naina Singh, were entrapped by undercover police, accused of sodomy and sent to trial.

*Rex Vs. Singh* debuted at Vancouver's [Out On Screen](#) film festival (Aug. 14-24), which screens queer cinema from around the world. The film's Toronto premiere is coming this October at [The Spinning Wheel Film Festival](#), Toronto's festival celebrating Sikh film.
